



\$16 mil tech school could be on CdS air-quality ballot

Hunding for a \$16 million engineering technical school could end up on the November ballot as part of a \$42 million bond issue being considered to resolve air-quality problems at Corona del Sol High School.

Discussion regarding such a specialty campus came up at a March 27 meeting of the Citizens High School Financial Advisory Committee, which was formed to advise the Tempe Union High School District's governing board on approaches to win voter approval of a proposed bond measure.

In its final report, the committee will recommend the amount of the bonds and identify projects that would justify any attendant tax increase.

Pressure from staff and parents within the Corona boundary, who have attributed health problems to the faulty system, has been so great that the state's High School Facilities Board agreed last week to reconsider its previous refusal to fund the project.

Among officials attending the March 27 meeting were Steve Adolph, district superintendent; Diane Meulemans, TUHSD chief financial officer; Robin Arredondo-Savage, TUHSD board member; Susan Edwards, principal at Corona; Dr. Anna Battle, principal at Desert Vista High School; and Kim Hilgers, principal at McClintock.

Janis Merrill, in-house legal counsel for the district, outlined legal limitations that would be faced by committee members, public officials and PTO members in promoting the November bond issue under the state's Open Meeting Law.

Merrill cautioned that any violations of the applicable statute could jeopardize the outcome of the vote.

The group also heard results of a recent survey of voters within the district by Paul Ulan of Primary Consultants. Of 28,000 parents of children registered to vote, only 8 percent turned out in the last election, the results showed.

Ulan also noted that 43,000 early ballots will be mailed, with an expected return of 80-85 percent.

Clearly, parents with children have not been among the majority of early-ballot voters, a population which often decides whether a bond proposal succeeds or fails.

Meulemans, the district's financial expert, answered two of the group's biggest questions:

How much will the bonds cost and what will they pay for?

The \$42 million estimate so far remains unchanged, according to Meulemans. As to how the proceeds would be spent, the answer is more controversial, based on reactions from audience members at the meeting.

Of the total, part would also be set aside for a new roof at Desert Vista High School; \$16 million would be earmarked for the proposed engineering school.

Harry Short, a Corona del Sol parent and member of the Kyrene Corridor Rotary Club, questioned why such an important bond would include so large an amount for an engineering school.

Superintendent Adolph responded that the district's preliminary research indicates a need for such a school in the Valley, and that it would attract 500 local and out-of-district students, providing additional income the district desperately needs.

Adolph cited demographics projecting declining enrollment in the district in the near future, along with a corresponding decline in revenue from the state to pay teacher salaries, hire staff and support school programs.

Meulemans was quick to point out that any decision regarding which projects will be included in the bonds will not be finalized until the next meeting of the committee.

No one in the audience questioned the seriousness of the budget crunch or the district's need for additional funding, illustrated in part by a recent decision to cut \$1.3 million in benefits for retiring teachers.

Virtually all agreed that the district needs approval of the November bonds merely to keep up with basic maintenance of existing facilities; otherwise, they said, the cost to taxpayers would only increase as building costs go up, foul air continues to circulate at Corona and the roof keeps on leaking at Desert Vista.

Committee members are scheduled to present their recommendations to the governing board within the next few weeks.

Early start date pushing Kyrene kindergarten signups

pening day is still five months away, but the rush is already on to get kids signed up for kindergarten.

Classes reconvene early this year in the Kyrene School District—Monday, Aug. 4—which has pushed pre-enrollment orientation sessions onto an accelerated schedule, parents into a fast-track mode and staff into virtual overdrive to accommodate an onslaught of pre-enrollment inquiries.

Although signups currently are below last year's pre-opening numbers, Kyrene officials say they're confident next year's kindergarten classrooms will be just as full as they are this year.

And while early registration helps the district plan for needed resources, officials admit the Aug. 4 start may come as a big surprise to many parents, especially those moving here from other parts of the country where classes sometimes don't begin until mid-September.

In terms of staffing, the district works hard to keep classroom size between 18 and 22 students, says spokeswoman **Nancy Dudenhoefer.** When capacity is reached at any of the 19 locations, she says, parents must look elsewhere.

Thus, even though enrollment continues well after the starting day of classes, signing up now helps ensure that the child will be able to attend a school of choice.

Also seen as a vital component of the preenrollment process is the annual recurrence of each school's Meet the Teacher Night, this year scheduled district-wide on Wednesday and Thursday, July 30 and 31.

"This is huge," says Dudenhoefer, noting that meet-the-teacher events are particularly important for kindergartners, most of whom will be attending school for the first time. It's also an important information-gathering opportunity for parents who weren't able to sign up during the early-registration period, she said.

Of the nearly 12,000 students enrolled in Kyrene schools, approximately 2,200 are kindergartners, Dudenhoefer says. The number remains high, she says, because of what Kyrene feels are advances in curriculum, program and technology, including multiple computers in every classroom.

"There are typically five laptops in each room, and the students use them to make electronic portfolios or work on a particular project," Dudenhoefer said. "It's what today's kids know—not the kindergarten class of mommy and daddy's days."

The district's adoption of a laptop program was one of the factors in its recent recognition by the National School Board Association, Dudenhoefer noted.

Considered strengths in addition to technology and class size are highly qualified teaching staff, individualized plans for student achievement, art curriculum, music and physical education taught by specialists, classroom help from instructional assistants and support for at-risk children.

In addition to regular full-day programming, half-day kindergarten classes are available at selected locations. Also offered are before- and after-school childcare via Kyrene Kids Club, which has earned recognition as the state's best multi-site program.

As word of the availability of early kindergarten registration filters out via school marquees and word of mouth, the district's **Bonny Dolinsek** says her phones hardly have stopped ringing.

Dolinsek succeeds **Gerry Ryan**, who retired several months ago after more than 20 years as a school secretary and Kyrene's open-enrollment specialist. Dolinsek says one thing evidently hasn't changed in recent years: the multiplicity of questions parents ask.

Here, according to Dolinsek, are the things parents seem most eager to know, and her answers to those questions: Question: How old does my child need to be to enter Kyrene kindergarten?

Answer: We recommend your child be age five by Sept. 1 of the current school year. However, parents of children born between Sept. 1 and Dec. 31 may attend a kindergarten early-admissions information meeting to determine if they should fill out an application.

Q: I heard that in Arizona you pay for kindergarten.

A: Two years ago the state determined that all kindergarten would be free.

believe that building wealth involves more than anticipating the direction of the markets, interest rates, inflation or the economy. It takes more than knowing the next big IPO or investing in your brother-in-law's new network marketing idea. Building

wealth usually requires discipline; possibly a financial plan, advisors and/or mentors to keep you focused on your goals and to help you make appropriate decisions when temptation starts to rear its ugly head. But ultimately, building wealth takes knowledge ...

One of the most important things you may need to know and understand is the power of compounding interest. Some of you are wondering if you should read the rest of this column because you already know how compounding works, but it takes more than KNOWING about compounding ... in my opinion, you must DO! You must make decisions with that knowledge to use the power of compounding interest in your favor.

Most of you have heard the story of investor Joe who started his IRA at the age of 19 and made \$2000 contributions for 7 years versus Bob who waited until age 26 to start his IRA, contributing \$2000 for 40 years, both at 10% compounded returns per year. Who retired with the most money? Joe did due to having 7 more years of compounding that more than made up for the 33 additional years of contributions of Bob.*

So, if everyone knows and understands the potential power of compounding, why do we have an extremely low, if not negative, savings rate? Why is the debt load for Americans so high? Why is savings for retirement so minimal compared to other countries? If the power of compounding interest is so good for investing, doesn't it mean it is equally as detrimental for borrowing?

There is an old adage "He who understands interest, earns it. He who doesn't understand interest, pays it." The way I see it, we

as a society and as individuals have forgotten this very important and timely maxim. If you truly understand compounding, why is so much interest being paid and so little of it being earned?

With the exponentially changing global economy and additional competitive pressures from abroad, I expect increased concerns in our economy, industries and markets. Whether you are an individual, family or business owner, if you are financial leveraged beyond your comfort or sleeping level, now may be the time to look at your financial picture and make some hard decisions to get you back to a level of comfort.

If you need a refresher course on compounding tables, I recommend you find a volume of compounding interest tables and spend some time reviewing it. It may also be a great tool to start teaching your children about money and compounding. Learning about compounding is something I doubt they are going to learn in school. Albert Einstein thought it was pretty miraculous, maybe your kids will, too! If you can't find a book of tables, contact me and I will point you in the right direction.

Teens embark on lifesaving mission for starving children

Tho would think one small bag of something that looks like Cream of Wheat and costs only 15 cents could help save a child's life?

Several Kyrene Corridor kids and their parents will be donating their time next week in an attempt to mix the right proportion of ingredients that will be used to feed thousands of starving children throughout the world.

These volunteers will be filling bags with a mixture of dry food that, when mixed with water, becomes a lifesaving meal.

Members of the Corona del Sol Key

Club and the East Valley Boys Service Club will be donating their time in 4hour shifts to wear plastic caps and gloves on their hands to scoop up the right combination of dried food combined in bags that will be shipped to areas of need.

Feed My Starving Children is an organization dedicated to feeding starving children worldwide by having volunteers pack nutritious meals made up of rice, soy, vitamins and dehydrated vegetables in bags to be distributed through relief organizations to starving children.

Once the food reaches the children, water is added to make a nutritious meal. A single meal costs only 15 cents;

\$55 will feed one child for an entire year.

Last year alone, the group shipped FMSC depends on donations to purchase the supplies and volunteers to pack the bags at mobile packing events throughout the country. One of these is scheduled April 8-12 at Esperanza Lutheran Church, 2601 E. Thunderhill Place, Phoenix.

Although FMSC already has 1,200 volunteers signed up for the event and hopes to pack close to 250,000 meals, \$37,000 is needed to cover the cost of the meals. Ninety-five percent of the all donations go directly to the food program.

Checks—any amount, no matter

how small—should be made out to FMSC with "Esperanza Event" written on the memo line and dropped off at the church any time before April 15 or mailed to the Arizona Program Director, Janine Skinner. Information is available by sending email to azskinners@cox.net.

The Esperanza event is the second FMSC activity of its kind held in Arizona, with another scheduled for late August.

So. Tempe Sister City volunteers planning Hackett House festivities




The event features six different stations of Mexican food, along

Massage franchise proves to be hands-on success story

hether it's to reduce the agony of a strained muscle, minimize the effects of stress or simply give the body a relaxing treat, therapeutic massage has become today's treatment of choice for a growing throng of devotees.

Not to mention a thriving business enterprise for **Jon Brovitz**.

Brovitz and his wife **Bonnie** moved to the Valley from the San Francisco Bay Area in the aftermath of the dot-com fiasco. Finding the business opportunities here abundant and the cost of living more affordable, they decided to stay.

It wasn't long before the husband-and-wife team had connected with the Massage Envy franchise launched in Canada in 2001; by 2003, they had opened their first clinic in Chandler, followed the next year by one on Elliot Road in Tempe. Four more have been added since.

"Until learning more about it, I had viewed massage as a luxury you get when you're on vacation, staying at a resort," said Brovitz.

By making massage more affordable and offering it close to home on an easily arranged schedule, Brovitz says he not only has been able to grow the number of southeast Valley locations but start planning for more.

With the existing centers flourishing even during a downturn in the economy, Brovitz announced the opening of a new clinic this month in Chandler, with plans under way for two more in other southeast Valley locations in the near future.

While massage at one time was viewed by many as being affordable only to the elite few, it's seen by most today as a necessity, according to Brovitz.

"People who have chronic back or neck pain, fibromyalgia...something that won't go away...now find relief after just one visit," he said.

That word seems to be spreading, with Brovitz saying as many as 30 percent of his new customers have never had a massage before.

"People need to find an outlet, to take a vacation from all the stresses of their job. To just get away for an hour, to go back feeling relaxed...it becomes habit forming," he said.

Although he recognizes that economic conditions haven't been the best in recent months, he says he has confidence that his business will continue to thrive


"I think people will spend money on massage, even during tough times, because they (recognize the) need to relieve stress.

Aztecs boost record to 14-5, hold brief lead in 5A-1 polls

Corona del Sol High School's varsity baseball squad improved its record to an impressive 14-5 and briefly led the 5A-1 in power points and some newspaper polls.

Corona stacked up three more wins, but suffered two setbacks over the past two weeks. This column covers the period from March 17-31.

Mike Felton continues to lead the team in hitting with a .537 average, followed by Trevor Allen around .490. These two hitters along with Kirby Pellant tend to lead in virtually all of the offensive categories—hits, batting average, slugging percentage, on-base percentage, RBIs, steals and runs, to name a few. The team has 10 home runs and Chris Lopez still leads with three. Justin Klett leads in walks with 11.

The team is putting a high number of runners on base with seven starters and two utility players having a .450 or higher on-base percentage. That means that virtually the entire starting nine get on base (hit or walk) every other time they get to the plate (**Ryan Moore**, Pellant, Felton, **Tyler Giannonatti**, Allen, **Aaron Foshie**, Klett, **Alex Murietta** and Lopez).

Corona walloped three more non-conference opponents, outscoring Cibola, Central and North Canyon, 48 to 9. The contests really were not that close and reserves played many of the innings. In the two losses Corona was outscored 5-11.

Corona really needed to face some of this tougher pitching earlier in the season, but we think the bats will come around in the big games as the hitters adjust.

Kevin Collinge pitched another gem this week, holding Red Mountain to a 1-1 tie through 5. He has been the most consistent and solid performer for the Aztec's, but Corona has only managed 4 runs in three of his games (two losses and a no decision).

He really could easily be 6-o.

Corona also played Horizon under the Friday night lights, which proved troubling to Corona batters through four innings. Trailing 6-0, Corona staged a rally in the 5th with three runs, but a pitching change put a stop to that.

The Aztecs lost 3-6 in the last game before region play begins.

Sophmore **Austin Doll** is the Aztec ERA leader, but has logged just 11 innings. Collinge has thrown 30 innings and posts an impressive 1.37 ERA. Giannonatti has a 2.86 ERA in 22 innings. **Brock Abbadini** is the team strike out leader with 20 in 14 innings.

Only four weeks remain in the regular season. The Orange Men open region play against cross-town rival Mountain Pointe, followed by Desert Vista the next week.

The schedulers were good to Corona, with only two games in three of the last four weeks, before the state tournament begins.



Q: Will my child ride a bus to school? Is the bus only for kindergartners or will older kids be on it?

A: Bus service is available if you live more than a mile from the school. There is no separate bus service for kindergartners.

Q: What is the format during the kindergarten day – what are the hours school is in session?

A: Most schools start between 7:30 and 7:45 a.m. and end between 2:10 and 2:40 p.m.

You can contact your neighborhood school for exact times and to see if they are holding a kindergarten orientation.

Q: Will my child get to take a nap?

A: Most classrooms have a rest period.

Q: What can I do to help my child be as ready as possible for kindergarten in August?

A: It's legally required that your child have up-to-date immunizations, so that's a good thing to take care of over the summer. We also suggest you familiarize your child with the bus stop and the campus before school begins. As well, a couple weeks prior to the start of school, putting the child on a schedule that simulates the time they will have to awaken to get ready is helpful.

Q: When will I find out more about what my child will be doing next year?

A: School staffs start sending out letters the week of July 21; this usually includes the teacher's name and room number. Don't worry if for some reason you don't receive a letter. Simply plan to attend Meet the Teacher Night and someone at the event will give you that information.

The district encourages parents to return from vacation in time to attend Meet the Teacher Night, especially kindergarten families. The district also hosts Curriculum Nights about a month after school starts; at that time your child's teacher will run through everything you can expect your child to learn during the year.

Hide your license plate? OK, but don't think it's the perfect solution

ot long ago, my dad received a nondescript envelope from the city of Scottsdale containing a not-so-flattering photograph of himself and a traffic citation—he'd been nabbed for speeding by the cameras on Loop 101.

Then, a few days later, another envelope arrived, this one from a company claiming to have the solution to my dad's driving woes. What he needed, they suggested, was a license-plate cover.

How do these things work? we wondered.

Basically, they utilize a thin lens to bend the light emitted by the flash of photo-enforcement cameras, with the intent of rendering illegible the characters of your license plate.

For several weeks we pondered the legality of such a "solution." The letter stated that, "contrary to what you have heard, license plate covers are not illegal in Arizona."

Even then, the idea seemed debatable at best. After some investigation, here are the facts:

License plate covers (and sprays that serve to accomplish similar ends) are not illegal. That is, it is not illegal to own a license plate cover. They are illegal, however, when they are used to render the plate illegible.





According to Arizona Revised Statutes 28-2354, "A person shall maintain each license plate so it is clearly legible.

Bringing the issue closer to home is the recent appearance of cameras at more and more area intersections. Back in November, Tempe decided to install 20 new cameras around the city, including one at Warner and Rural roads.

These cameras incorporate technology that not only allows them to detect and capture red-light offenses, but also speed violations. So, yes, it is now possible to get a speeding ticket simply by going through a green light at camera-equipped intersection.

So back to my dad's dilemma:

In the end, he ordered two covers before determining that they're illegal.

My complaints and my mom's advice, however, ultimately caused him to discard the covers (wisely, I thought) early one Thursday morning.

Some drivers no doubt will continue to use consider the use of covers to obscure their license plates, just as my dad did in the beginning.

Just remember: While plate covers technically are still sitting on the fence of the law, neither legal (in use) nor illegal (in possession), the real solution to avoiding a citation is much simpler:

Watch your speed and brake at yellow lights.






In addition to meeting the learning goals of AYP, schools must test 95 percent of the students.

Parents with special circumstances during this period are urged to contact the child's teacher so that arrangements can be make for testing.



Tempe gets high marks from residents; survey captures record satisfaction with city services, programs, facilities



Results are in from the City of Tempe's first comprehensive citizen satisfaction survey since 2000 and residents have expressed largely positive feedback on essential services and amenities provided by the city.

More than 1,000 residents weighed in on questions dealing with water service, parks, trash collection, public safety and more. Their ratings give the City of Tempe important information about how well it is providing services.

Kansas-based ETC Institute conducted the survey and compared Tempe to its database of cities across the country. Tempe ranked in the top five percent of cities nationally when it came to the satisfaction of residents.

Survey respondents expressed overall satisfaction levels of 88 percent — that's 35 percent above the national average.

Highlights include:

• Satisfaction with bulk item pickup and removal services rated 22 percent above the national average (82 percent in Tempe vs. 60 percent in U.S.)

• Satisfaction with the condition of streets in neighborhoods rated 16 percent above the national average (76 percent in Tempe vs. 60 percent in U.S.)

• Satisfaction with city water services rated 15 percent above the national average (88 percent in Tempe vs. 73 percent in U.S.)

Recycle household products: Tempe residents can help keep their community clean

and safe by using the Valley's first permanent Household Products Collection Center (HPCC).

The Tempe HPCC, located at 1320 E. University Drive, is open to Tempe residents and accepts any household paint, chemical or pesticide – even if it's old and has no label. Properly recycling these substances prevents them from being dumped down drains, dumped onto the ground or placed in the trash, all of which are harmful to ground water and urban lakes.

The Tempe HPCC cannot accept tires, appliances, needles, ammunition and radioactive waste. Use caution in transporting chemicals to the center by never mixing products and never putting containers in the same bag.

In celebration of Earth Day, the HPCC will hold tours of the facility and will host a swap area. From April 21-25, the HPCC will expand its hours and will be open to Tempe residents from 7 a.m. to noon.

Tours will be given daily at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. For more information, call 480-350-2818 or visit www.tempe.gov/HHW/.

The swap area offers recycled and useable household cleaners, stains, car care products, lawn care products, pesticides and home repair products. The HPCC also has gallon and quart-size containers of latex paint, as well as 5-gallon containers of exterior-use latex paint. The outdoor paint is available in white, grey and tan. All products are free and available as long as they last.

Free bus passes for youth: Starting May 12, the City of Tempe will being issuing free 2008-2009 bus passes for Tempe youth. In its fourth year, the Tempe Youth Free Bus Pass program allows students ages six to 18, who are residents of Tempe, to ride all Valley Metro bus routes for free.
